Chief Ken Walker has been in law enforcement for more than 45 years, and served as Chief for more than 35 years. He was Chief in Lubbock and McKinney, Texas, and served as the Chief of Police for the City of West University Place, Texas until retiring in 2025.

Chief Walker has served as president of the Texas Police Chiefs Association, the North Texas Police Chiefs Association, the South Plains Police Chiefs Association, and the Houston Area Police Chiefs Association. He is a life member of the IACP and has served on the IACP Board of Directors, the Financial Review Committee (FRC), and the Police Investigative Operations Committee.



Police Chief Ken Theis will be retiring from the City of Humble this June after a 42 year career with the agency.

Chief Theis started as a reserve police officer in 1983 and became a full-time officer in 1987. Chief Theis was promoted through the ranks before being named the 10th Chief of Police in October of 2020 - a position once held by his father Jack Theis. During his time as Chief, Theis focused on modernizing the Police Department's operations, increased staffing levels, and implemented new and cutting edge technologies and equipment. Theis has left an indelible mark on the Department and the City as a whole and while bittersweet, his retirement is well earned.
