The City of Hedwig Village is located in Harris County, Texas and is a part of a collection of upscale communities known as the Memorial Villages. The Memorial Villages also include the cities of Spring Valley Village, Piney Point Village, Bunker Hill Village, Hillshire Village and Hunters Creek Village.

According to local historian Tom Roth, the Memorial Villages derived from land grants given to John Taylor and Isaac Bunker for their service during the Texas War of Independence from Mexico. Over the years, they sold parts of their land and the area was settled. In the early years, the area contained mostly farms, but there were also sawmills and lumberyards due to the area being heavily wooded .

In 1954, a group of citizens intent on instituting zoning and resisting being annexed by Houston, incorporated the Memorial Villages and the city of Hedwig Village was born. The city is named after Hedwig Road, which was named after Hedwig Jankowski Schroeder, a landowner who emigrated from Germany.

Before the incorporation, the Harris County Sheriff's Office policed the area. After incorporating, Hedwig Village appointed one paid marshal and had several volunteers patrolling in their own cars.



As time passed, the citizens of Hedwig Village realized that in order to meet the unique policing challenges of its community, they would need to form their own police department, and, in December of 1976, the Hedwig Village Police Department was created. The original department consisted of one police chief and eight police officers. The first chief was Jimmy Jones, a retired Houston Police Officer.

Today, Hedwig Village is a dynamic city with approximately 2500 residents, over 500 businesses and a day-time population of around 30,000 people. The police department has become a fully functional modern department with 23 full-time employees and, in 2016, moved into a brand new police station that will allow the department to meet any challenges the future may hold.



9 arrested for celebratory gunfire on New Year's Eve, HPD says

The Houston Police Department said eight adults and one juvenile were taken into custody and charged for shooting guns on New Year's Eve.

HOUSTON — Nine people were arrested for celebratory gunfire on New Year's Eve, according to the Houston Police Department.

Chief Troy Finner said eight adults and one juvenile were arrested and charged. The juvenile is 13 and the adults ranged in age from 20 to 41.

"The only celebrating they did was in jail," Finner said in a statement on Saturday.





Due to late-breaking changes in the cybersecurity climate, TCOLE has decided to delay launch of the Secure Share platform until March 1, 2022. While we are confident that we have created a secure platform, we are also mindful of the sensitive nature of the data being shared and feel it is imperative to move forward with caution.

The Apache Log4j flaw is a recent exploit discovered that many major tech companies are currently scrambling to patch. During a meeting with the Texas Department of Information Resources (DIR) on Friday, December 17, 2022, all state agencies were asked to survey their suite of software and applications for the existence of this vulnerability on their network and encouraged to harden their protective security measures. While we are still learning more about this exploit and how widespread it is, we are confident that none of our existing applications (TCLEDDS, MyTCOLE, etc...) contain this vulnerability, nor does the TCOLE Secure Share system we've developed.

Out of an abundance of caution, and following DIR's advice, we will be taking additional measures to evaluate the development processes as well as performing additional penetration and vulnerability scanning.

We are using this extra time to create additional training materials and resources. We will remain in communication as we progress.

What will January 1st look like?

All appointments of TCOLE licensees on or after January 1, 2022, will be required to include the submission of a Background Confirmation Form. When you pull an F-5R through TCLEDDS, the Background Confirmation Form will be included in the F-5R as the second page and will be auto-populated with the licensee's information.

A sample of the Background Confirmation Form is attached and can also be found on our [website](#). You will submit one Background Confirmation Form per applicant, signed by the Chief Administrator to: secureshare@tcole.texas.gov. You will keep one copy on file.

Until the Secure Share platform has launched, you will continue to use the method for reviewing documents that you have always used, most likely in person.
